ON THE DIRECTION OF THE FATAL SHOT
page 294.

"Twenty feet below the bathroom window..there is a vacant lot.. covered with bushes 12 to 15 feet high. Dr. King's chauffeur, Solomon Jones, told reporters a few minutes after the shooting that "just after the shot fired", a man with a sheet over his head ran out of the bushes heading south".

"Cornbread" Carter, another witness, said he saw "the man" fire the shot from the bushes and then "take off".

"From a concealed position in a firehouse..police were watching the area of Dr. King's room. Both firemen and policemen..heard the shot, and they all thought it came from the bushes, not from any window 20 feet above."
